And your Public Service Advocate, Mr Greg Vines is now working hard to set up a Civil Service Commission.

I also want to thank the Victorian Government for the consistent and generous support it has provided to my country over many years.

The projects funded by your Government are too many to mention here today – our lunch would turn into dinner.
